For groups in public spaces	<p>Fire Safety Plans The next time your building gets a visit from the fire department, they will likely be asked to provide the facility's Fire Preparedness Plan or Fire Safety Plan (FSP). This is part of the National Fire Code - Alberta Edition requirements that were renewed in 2023. An FSP is now required for all public locations where groups of people gather. Leagues can follow this link to complete an FSP Intake Form. This will generate an FSP with the specific information for their Site.
